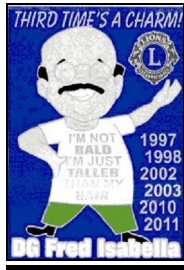

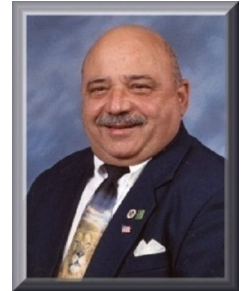

But an extremely successful global program can only define part of the association’s overall image.

“People do not join “The International Association of Lions Clubs.” They join a Lions Club – YOUR Lions club. While a positive image will encourage prospective members and supports to think well of your club, only a vigorous and successful local public relations program will move them to donate time and money and accept an invitation to membership.

“To assist clubs and districts, we have created a new electronic library of PR tools – a “one stop shopping” section of the web site that has everything needed to run a successful public relations program.

“With the numbers of visitors growing each month, the redesigned Lions Clubs International web site is now the fastest way to find information and connect with others. Browse the web site. Become familiar with it. Use the search engine to find what you are looking for expeditiously.

Dear Lions, Lioness and Leos---

Revisit Your LIONS “Job Description” and Make Communication a Personal Goal This Year

Volunteerism comes in a variety of packages and formats, especially as it relates to our individual, our club, and our district responsibilities as a LIONS volunteer in service. I’m sure that in the heart of every LION, LIONESS and LEO there is the feeling and desire of wanting to better serve your community and to make life for others better than it was the day before...to make Lionism this year better than it was in previous years. We all constantly set our LIONS goals for the future and hopefully revise them as necessary; we operate under a substantial LIONS code of ethics; we utilize bylaws structure and job descriptions that guide us to do the right thing as we understand it. To accomplish our individual, club and district missions we must add fuel to the fire. We are in constant need to acquire more information and the advice of others to make our decisions appropriately, and to advance each goal that improves upon the past and present days. This process is dynamic and ever-changing, but it is also a process that each of us must keep in order and place into forward motion. Lionism deserves this and we are its advocates to make it happen.

So what is my point? First and foremost, I’m not intending to be “preaching to the choir” and if it feels that way to you, then I sincerely ask you to reconsider and re-energize your own batteries and help us all get applicable messages into the hands of others who may be less aware. Our collective knowledge base about Lionism is broad and varied and plentiful among our members. The information under which we implement our LIONS goals and decisions can have a much greater positive impact when we are communicating and showing our thoughts across all levels of Lionism. There is obvious strength in what LIONS stands for, and in sharing common knowledge, messages, reports, goals and processes among individuals, clubs, district and state/international levels. Communication can only bring more strength and prosperity to your club and your District 14-N.

Broadening our communication opportunities is key to all volunteers of Lionism. Case in point...the recent officer leadership training programs facilitated by Lion Mark Carter represented excellent opportunities for those in attendance to learn, share, and discuss club structure and function, advancement and motivation among individuals who share our common bond to serve others. This was an excellent job well done, and an opportunity for all of us to re-evaluate, re-group and grow from the shared knowledge on submission of reports, goal setting, project and fundraiser selection, budgets, committee assignments. And if you did not get to a training program, then I ask you please to take some time to review the copy of your club’s District 14-N leadership manual, the club and district bylaws and policy manuals that thoroughly describe every “job description” that LIONS has to offer. Found on our District 14-N, State and International websites, these are excellent resources for us to use, to grasp the bigger picture of Lionism and how we are part of it.

In addition, some clubs have begun to share their individual newsletters and link their websites to the District 14-N website. Editor Mark Carter and co-editor Betty Ivell offer an excellent communication newsletter that is both mailed and found on the district’s website. Webmaster Betty is faithful in her service to the communication process by continually updating our district website with the latest information we all are wanting or needing to know. I personally have bookmarked my own club, district, state and international websites for easy access, and I anxiously look forward to the updates on each of the sites and in each of the newsletters available. The information is invaluable and should be shared among all members.

Some questions are worth asking here. How well are we doing as individuals, clubs, and the district at getting our messages into the right hands? What is our individual role to make sure others are getting that message? Each of us would profit by revisiting our own LIONS “Job Description” and making communication a personal goal this year. Every LION, LIONESS and LEO with a computer should bookmark the four websites and take on the communication role to assure that those without computer access are receiving the updated, valued, information from others most willing to

share. There is comfort in working with others, in communicating with others, in sharing our successes with others district-wide. It is our collective strength to do so...and an admirable goal for District 14-N.

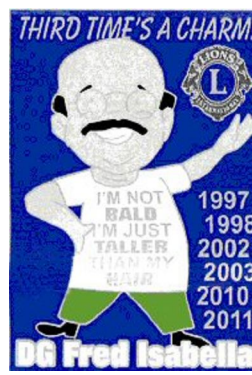

Editors Note: We thank Ed Bono, President of the Leechburg-Gilpin Lions, for sharing with us the article on their newest member, Lion Kyle Sarver, which appeared in the 6 July issue of the *Valley News Dispatch*. “When recent Leechburg Area High School graduate Kyle Sarver walks onto the campus of Penn State Behrend in the fall, he’ll be different from most of the other new students. He’ll be a sophomore. Sarver, 18 — who graduated from high school last month — earned a year’s worth of credits by taking classes at Penn State New Kensington while still in high school. The dual enrollment program enables high school juniors and seniors to take college classes and earn college credits.

“From the second half of his junior year in high school...Sarver has earned 35 college credits. He’s taken courses in calculus, physics, chemistry, economics, statistics, English, speech, music and psychology. Sarver says his teachers and classmates didn’t know he was a high school kid unless he told them. ‘At first, I thought I’d take a few to get a couple basic courses out of the way and lessen the load at college,’ Sarver said. ‘After I realized how many I was on track to take, I set my goal to have my freshman year completed before I entered college.’ No other student has earned as many credits in the program as Sarver has. ‘I’m extremely proud of Kyle,’ Leechburg Area Superintendent James Budzilek said. ‘His hard work has paid off for him. It’s very impressive.’

“Sarver is a standout at Penn State New Kensington, where most high school students doing dual enrollment take just one or two classes per semester, said Patricia Brady, director of enrollment management at the Upper Burrell campus. PSNK usually has about 36 dual enrollment students per year, Brady said. “They are treated like any other college student. When they’re in these classes, they have to meet the same requirements as any other college student would.” According to his mother, Linda Sarver, ‘if he had not had this opportunity, he would’ve been taking four or five study halls during the course of the day.’

“Kyle Sarver was a high school student in the morning and a college student in the afternoon. He used his high school study halls to do college homework. ‘I had to have a different mindset going into college. It was definitely a lot more work,’ he said. ‘At first, it was hard trying to organize my time efficiently to keep up with college and high school at the same time. I quickly transitioned into the college atmosphere and just went from there.’

“Kyle not only did well enough to pass his classes at college, but he also graduated second in his roughly 50-member high school class. ‘We could not be prouder of him,” Sarver’s mother said. ‘The goals that he has set for himself have always been very high. To accomplish this as well as maintain his grade point average that he did and graduate salutatorian of his class is amazing.’

“Inspired by his grandfather, Ronald Libengood, Sarver plans to major in electrical engineering at Penn State Behrend in Erie, where he’ll be in the honors program. He wants to earn a minor in business management.”

Nice job Lion Kyle...and the Leechburg-Gilpin Lions Club for recruiting him!
