





Jared Box Project

The Jared Box Project is named for a boy named Jared who had cancer. While receiving his chemotherapy treatments in the children's hospital, Jared would take a backpack with some of his toys to play with during the treatments he had to undergo. Playing with his toys took his mind off of the therapy his treatments were providing. But Jared noticed that other children, who were undergoing similar treatments, didn't have any toys to help them be distracted from the painful chemotherapy. So, he shared his toys with other children that were getting their therapy at the same time he did. He saw that it brought them so much relief from their monotonous treatments, just as it did with him. Jared did not survive his cancer. But his school, instead of donating to his family and his memory, decided to do something similar to what Jared did, by putting together boxes of toys, activities and games which would be distributed to children who were undergoing treatments of any kind in the hospital, in order to take their minds off of the pain and monotony of the treatments. These became the Jared Boxes. So far, organizations across the country have donated over 1 million Jared Boxes to hospitals that treat children, which these children can get and take home with them.

The District 14-N Governor, Maria Loudermilk, decided to support the Jared Box project by having clients of the Beaver County Lighthouse for the Blind assist in putting together and decorating fifty Jared Boxes as one of their activities during their Monday craft class on 4 March 2024. The clients and Lion volunteers from Beaver Falls, Slippery Rock and Riverside-Hopewell Lions Clubs, put together the boxes with items provided by DG Maria and PDG Jeff Loudermilk, into fifty boxes for children ages infant to tweens and teens. The blind clients enjoyed the project and expressed their desire to do

the project again near the Christmas holidays as a special gift to the children. Over twenty clients and twelve volunteers assisted with the activities. The fifty boxes were delivered to the UPMC Children's Hospital North Surgery Center in Sewickley, PA on 11 March 2024. The administrator of the Jared Box Program at the hospital was so excited about the gift of the boxes, she couldn't thank us enough. She said, "I really didn't know much about Lions except that my grandfather was a Lion and I remember him talking about them. I thought at first that Lions were just about glasses and vision. But after I looked them up on line, I learned that they do so much more than just vision programs. I was so impressed about who the Lions are and what they do."

They also had a successful sausage fundraiser this month raising \$700 for their charities.









ON THE ROAD AGAIN?

The Story Of This Haunted Bridge In Darlington, Pennsylvania Will Make Your Hair Stand On End!



Even if we don't necessarily believe in the paranormal, most of us enjoy a good ghost story every now and then.

Pennsylvania's teeming with the paranormal, which means we're never wanting for a really good haunted tale. If you're a bit of a skeptic, you might find yourself waffling after reading the story of this haunted bridge in Darlington, Pennsylvania.

Tragedy is often at the very core of the paranormal – a <u>grief-stricken bride</u> waiting for her love who never returns, a <u>mother and baby</u> who meet their tragic end at a famous covered

bridge, and a young girl killed crossing a bridge on her prom night.

The tale of Summit Cut Bridge, too, is steeped in tragedy, and many tell of running into a mysterious lady in white, especially late at night. Sat along Shenango Road in Beaver County, Summit Cut Bridge served as a railroad bridge in the closing days of the 19th-century. One of the first tragedies, at least if you believe the tales told through time, happened sometime in the mid-20th century. Still another tale tells of a woman named Josephine going off that very bridge at the end of the 1890s.





A woman was driving down the road late at night. Everything about her – her name, her age, where she was going so deep into the evening – is a mystery. Legend, though, says she misjudged a curve and soared off of the bridge onto the railroad tracks below.

In the more sinister accounts, witnesses say the lady in white frantically beckoned to them in desperate need of help but, upon getting closer, she appeared to want them to fall from the bridge too. While the identity of these mysterious ladies in white have perhaps been lost to time, travelers still tell of seeing one meandering along the bridge, usually around midnight. Simple Steps to Lowering Your Risk of Diabetes


• Control your weight:

Losing weight can help if your weight is above the healthy-weight range. Losing 7-10% of your current weight can cut your chances of developing type 2 diabetes in half.


- Get moving—and turn off the television—exercise!
