Qualities of Effective Leadership

The Global Leadership Team (GLT) articles in The Pride usually involve informing PA Lions which symposiums, retreats or institutes we have completed or planned for the future: a type of status report on how MD-14 GLT is succeeding and to promote our events to our Lions membership.

This multi-part article will be a little different. We are going to focus on aiding our MD-14 Lions membership in sensing which Lions in your club or district have the "Qualities of Effective Leadership." You should be able to recognize some of these leadership traits in the Lions leaders you serve alongside, perhaps in yourself or perhaps they're qualities you may realize you were lacking.



Let me begin, in no particular order, with the quality of "Passion."

I personally feel it is the most important and underrated trait in any leader. I have not seen a successful leader, in any role, who did not have a degree of passion for their responsibilities. This enthusiasm holds the Lion and their team involved and enjoying the results of the service project or fundraiser to reach their goals.

The next trait I will focus on is being a "Coach."

Many Lions have a mentor that they can claim "I wouldn't be the Lion I am today without PDG Joe's guidance!" This coach would be more experienced to lead and guide you in your journey into successful leadership. Effective leaders are always keeping their eyes open for a Lion who displays the hint of future leadership skills. Perhaps the Lion just needs a certain amount of guidance and advice. A pat on the back is the best encouragement a leader can give any Lion. A "Servant Leader" is a coach/mentor who does not look for recognition for themselves, but instead develops success stories for other Lions. It is a wonderful feeling when a Lion you have coached becomes successful in their service to Lions and their community.



The recognition of the need for a camp for blind people in Pennsylvania was extensively discussed at a meeting of a group of blind people in Philadelphia on November 9, 1947. After several meetings, a corporation was formed in Mifflin County and approved by the Mifflin County Court in 1948 to establish "Vacations for the Blind" camp. In 1953, the name was changed to "Beacon Lodge Camp for the Blind" and in 1994 the name was changed to "PA Lions Beacon Lodge Camp" to reflect the support of the Camp that comes from the Pennsylvania Lions and to indicate that the Camp serves more than just the visually impaired.

PA Beacon Lodge Camp is situated on 583 beautiful acres in the natural woodlands along the Juniata River in Central Pennsylvania, near Mount Union. It is where children and adults with visual, hearing, mental, and physical disabilities gather from all over Pennsylvania and surrounding states for a relaxing and fun vacation.

The Camp is divided into the Adult Camp and the Children's Camp. Project New Hope, the Camp for Veterans and their families was established in 2014. Each Camp is run separately. Campers can participate in fishing, bowling, swimming, wall climbing, zip lining, archery, miniature golf and much more. The Camp emphasizes what the camper can do and not what they cannot do. The Camp, being a non-profit, depends on funding from the Lions of Pennsylvania and other sources for donations.

The **Project New Hope** program offered at the Beacon Lodge Camp is an opportunity for disabled Veterans regardless of branch of service or era in which a Veteran has served, ALL PA disabled Veterans and their immediate families are welcome.

As a Lion in Pennsylvania, I know first-hand the impact this Camp has had on children, adults, and Veterans each year, and I humbly ask for your organization's support in any of the following ways:

- 1. Help us recruit disabled Veterans and their immediate families to attend one of our five-day summer retreat camps at NO cost. (June 15-19 and August 3-7, 2024)
- 2. Help Project New Hope with Veteran campers' fees (approximately \$1200 for a family of four)
- 3. Help the Camp with their wish list of items (attached)
- 4. Help the Camp with financial assistance for some much-needed repairs

With the ongoing fundraising efforts of Lions across Pennsylvania, PA Beacon Lodge Camp needs your help to keep going. I ask for your organization's support to assist the PA Beacon Lodge Camp in providing specialized recreation for our disabled Veterans. It is an honor to offer Project New Hope to the elite group of PA disabled men and women who have served our country!







Kutztown University's Visual Impairment Program Awarded \$30,000 from Kutztown Lions Club

Kutztown University received \$30,000 from the Kutztown Lions Club to support graduate students enrolled in the university's visual impairment program.

"The visual impairment program at KU is very grateful for the Lions Club's Support," said Dr. Nicole Johnson '05, professor of special education. "This gift will have far-reaching effects to help recruit teachers of the visually impaired, which is very needed."

Kutztown is the only state university in Pennsylvania to offer a program focused on preparing teachers of the visually impaired.

Graduate students can choose to pursue the visual impairment as a track within the M.Ed. in Multicultural Education program. Through this concentration, teacher candidates who only want to teach students with visual impairments will achieve a thorough understanding of all required competencies for certification. Field experiences are provided in both elementary education and visual impairment settings.

Representatives from the Kutztown Lions Club visited KU's campus for a check presentation, spending time with members of the KU community in the university's Vision Lab.

The Lions Club International's mission is to empower Lions Clubs, volunteers, and partners to improve health and well-being, strengthen communities, support those in need through humanitarian services and grants that impact lives globally, and encourage peace and international understanding.

"The Kutztown Lion's Club enriches the Kutztown community in a wide variety of ways, and we have a particular focus on supporting those in our community with visual impairment," said Matthew Dietrich, president. "Now, we are supporting those who have made a professional commitment to serve this very important population."

"The visual impairment program is one of Kutztown's finest," said Alex Ogeka, executive director of the KU Foundation. "The Lions Club's generous support provides crucial funding to graduate students whose expertise will ultimately shape the lives of individuals with visual impairments, overall strengthening our community."








Re: PA State Sales & Use Tax Exemption Form

Date: July 7, 2021

Pennsylvania State Sales and Use Tax Exemption form awarded to the PA State Council of Lions Clubs for use by clubs during fundraising projects. This form is valid through February 2026 and may be duplicated as needed but **SHOULD NOT BE POSTED ON CLUB OR DISTRICT** websites or social media where it would be accessible by the general public. We do not want to risk losing the exemption as the result of improper use of this form.

Courtesy of Multiple District 14 Legal Counsel Lion Ashley Grimm:

"The PA State Council of Lions Clubs is registered in Pennsylvania as an Institution of Purely Public Charity under The Institutions of Purely Public Charity Act, 10 P.S. § 371.et seq. As such, it, and its subsidiary clubs, quality for an exemption from PA Sales tax. This means clubs are exempt from paying sales tax when they purchase goods or services. It does NOT mean they are exempt from remitting sales and use tax to Pennsylvania during fundraisers."

NO LIQUOR IN RAFFLES!

Liquor not permitted in basket raffles

Please be aware: A popular staple in basket raffles is a "no-no."

After researching the matter with the Executive



Director of the PA House of Representatives' Liquor Committee and the PA Liquor Control Board, MD-14 legal counsel Lion Ashley Grimm reported that "liquor is not permitted to be in a basket for purposes of a raffle. This also includes silent auctions.


"This equates to selling liquor without a license," Lion Grimm said. "A wine and spirits gift card is permitted to be included in a raffle basket, though." Lion Grimm's research supported the opinion expressed by Lawrence County Treasurer Richard Rapone in a recent New Castle News story that had prompted MD-14 State Council Chair Bill Morgan to contact Lion Grimm.

As part of the News story, Capt. Jamie Jones of the LCB Enforcement Bureau said including any type of alcoholic beverage – be it a six pack of beer, a bottle of wine, a bottle of whiskey or the like – is a violation of the Pennsylvania Liquor Code, Title 47, and is an unclassified misdemeanor offense. The fine upon conviction is \$500, levied to the organization sponsoring the fundraiser and not the donor of the basket.

In the News story, Rapone pointed out, under the state's small games of chance law, it is illegal to host basket raffles at fundraising dinners used to benefit someone who is sick.
